Aims of Collective Worship at Dallam Community Primary School

- Explore together the world in which we live
- Develop a community spirit

The Organisation of Collective Worship

Collective Worship is distinct from curriculum time. It offers provision of opportunities for pupils to develop their spiritual, moral, social and cultural understanding whilst also providing a time for reflection. At Dallam Community Primary School Collective Worship will address a wide variety of themes and topics to provide pupils with the opportunity to 'respond' at their own level.

Monday- Whole school celebration assembly with school pray and reflection time

Tuesday - Song practice with school pray and reflection time

Wednesday- Class reflection time- current affairs through Picture News/ Newsround with discussion and reflection time

Thursday- Class reflection time- current affairs through Picture News/ Newsround with discussion and reflection time

Friday- Whole school assembly focussing on our school vision and ethos also a time for sharing our curriculum (class podcast) along with school pray and reflection time

Visitors will be welcome to lead acts of Collective Worship from time to time and will be given guidance on acts of Collective Worship at our school. Leaders from faiths and non-religious groups within the area will increase the pupils' awareness, promote respect and raise self-esteem of pupils who belong to these traditions.

Withdrawal

Parents/Carers have the right to withdraw their child from any acts of Collective Worship. Those wishing to make such a request are encouraged to discuss with the head teacher: a) any particular concerns they may have and (b) practical arrangements for the withdrawal.
