Their have a go attitude, determination and support for each other were so lovely to see. The weekend was filled with fun, laughter and screams of excitement; their behaviour was exemplary and their confidence and independence shone through. Well done Year 6 – we are incredibly proud of you all.

Over the last week, I have been treated with some lovely snacks and drinks as children have been developing their food technology skills. On Friday, I enjoyed a delicious fairy cake with my morning coffee, made by children in Year 6 and on Thursday, two children from Acorns came to visit me in my office with the most refreshing homemade lemonade that I have ever tasted. As part of their work exploring the colour yellow, the children looked at, smelled, tasted and felt the textures of fresh lemons before squeezing them and preparing a sweet and tangy drink that was enjoyed by all. We definitely have some budding chefs in school – I can't wait to sample what they make next!

When I popped into Cedar Class earlier this week, our new Key Stage 1 children were having the best time exploring how to build a tower that didn't fall down. The children loved exploring how to make their structures more stable by building a wider base and really demonstrated our school value of resilience as they competed to create the tallest tower. They have also had fun developing their art skills as they practised varying the thickness of their lines and painting in the style of Paul Klee. They brought their skills right up to date by transferring their skills to the ipad: learning how to change the thickness of the lines they draw using digital media. Mrs Read is super proud of her class – they are truly rising to the challenge of KS1!

Our PCSO, Dean Bickerton, has been into school this week to invite children from Olive and Cherry Classes to apply for a place in our mini police initiative. I will be shortlisting and interviewing for the positions next week. I can't wait to read the application forms!
